From the Parish Priest...

Violence in a Sydney orthodox Church this week may well have put some of us off a bit. Happily, its so rare in Sydney and in Australia generally as to be almost unheard of. I encourage you all to add to your regular prayer schedule a prayer for peace in our own city, and especially those troubled by mental health challenges.

Similarly, we were all saddened to see an unhinged man become violent at a Sydney shopping centre this week, and again, we need to be people of peace and prayer, and also, trust in God's providential care for us and not be ruled by fear.

I encourage you all to stop by St Michael's to light a candle in the Lady Chapel and say a prayer for all those affected by the attacks, especially those injured or who died as a result and their families mourning their loss.

This week we also remember all our fellow Australians who have died in war in our defense forces. In particular, we should pray for the response of the souls of our fellow Australians who have died defending the freedoms we enjoy and so frequently take for granted. Again, to light a candle in the lady chapel and to pray for those who have died is a good and holy thing to do.

Printed on the back page of this bulletin is the prayer that comes at the end of the funeral liturgy and which Catholics customarily pray for the dead: "Eternal Rest Grant unto them, O Lord, and may perpetual light shine upon them and may they rest in peace, Amen." Let us not be so ungrateful as to forget to pray for those who died that we might live in peace and freedom.

Our next women's reflection morning will be on again in May, details are inside the bulletin. Our last reflection morning was attended by about 25 women of all ages, some nursing toddlers, some grandmothers, all wanting to reflect together on how, like Mary, they can bring the beauty of the Faith alive for their families.

A number of men from our Men's Spirituality group have done the overnight walking pilgrimage the "Camino of St Joseph" which is coming up next weekend. Beginning in Austral and ending in Moorebank with stops at 7 churches along the way for prayer and fellowship. Pilgrimage always brings with it extraordinary graces. I encourage our men to give it a go!

Last weekend we commenced our 8 week introductory Bible study and had 25 parishioners present, again of all ages from young adults up to our elders. It was a great atmosphere, and everyone enjoyed coming together to learn together and share our faith.

The Great Adventure Bible Study takes us through the narrative books of the Bible (it those that tell the story of salvation) leaving aside those books that are about other matters (eg the Psalms, which are prayers; Leviticus, which is rules on worship, etc). There's much more to come!


