The Ascension of The Lord, Year B

From the Parish Priest...

Completing the work of Salvation, Christ returns to the Father in his risen and glorified body by ascending visibly into heaven while the Apostles look on in wonder. After the mystery of faith, we proclaim that the Mass celebrates "the memorial of the blessed Passion, the Resurrection from the dead, and the glorious Ascension into heaven of Christ, your Son, our Lord." (first Eucharistic Prayer).

Our Faith teaches us that the work of our salvation performed by Jesus Christ is encompassed by all three and is not complete until after the Lord's Ascension back to the Father. He told his disciples that if he did not go away, the Counsellor (ie the Holy Spirit) will not come to you. The Holy Spirit could only be poured out upon the Church when the work of salvation was complete when Jesus returned to the Father.

Returning to God the Father in his glorified and risen humanity he now "sits at the right hand of the Father" as we pray in the Creed, showing that Christ is both equal to God the Father (the meaning of 'sits at the right hand') and also, that he intercedes for us eternally. God, having taken to himself human nature in the person of Jesus Christ, has purified it of sin and redeemed it and taken it up into heaven.

Where the head of the mystical body of Christ has gone, we his members are now able to follow. Such is the meaning of the great feast of the Ascension and why it comes at the end of the Easter Season, even while looking forward to Pentecost.

Jesus leaves the Apostles and other disciples present to witness his ascension staring up into heaven, as we see in our first reading for this weekend. Being told by the angels that "he would return just as you have seen him go", the Church is in a certain sense still looking up towards heaven awaiting his return.

Significantly, the Apostles were looking up and to the East, which is one reason why Churches are typically arranged so the people face East when looking at the altar. It's also why the altar (which means, literally, 'the high place') is raised up. It is meant to represent heaven, where Jesus intercedes eternally for us before the Father, showing, as he did his disciples in his Resurrection appearances, the wounds on his body by which he has paid the price for sin.

Daily in the morning prayer of the church prayed by priests and religious we pray the Benedictus, the prayer attributed to the father of St John the Baptist. In it we hear of the loving kindness of the heart of our God "who visits us like the dawn from on high". I always think of this image in relation to the Mass.

In the great medieval Cathedrals, such as that at Cologne in Germany, the light of dawn falls on the altar just as Mass is being celebrated. I witnessed this at World Youth Day in 2005 and the experience and the image have stayed with me. In the Mass we celebrate the mystery of our salvation in Christ. The symbols, prayers and rituals we have surrounded it with are to remind us of the mystery we celebrate.

The Ascension of The Lord, Year B

First Reading (Acts of the Apostles 1:1-11)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is,' he had said, 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.

enlighten the eyes of your mind so that you can see what hope his call holds for you, what rich glories he has promised the saints will inherit and how infinitely great is the power that he has exercised for us believers. This you can tell from the strength of his power at work in Christ, when he used it to raise him from the dead and to make him sit at his right hand, in heaven, far above every Sovereignty, Authority, Power, or Domination, or any other name that can be named, not only in this age, but also in the age to come. He has put all things under his feet, and made him, as the ruler of everything, the head of the Church; which is his body, the fullness of him who fills the whole creation.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Jesus showed himself to the Eleven and said to them, 'Go out to the whole world; proclaim the Good News to all creation. He who believes and is baptised is saved; he who does not believe will be condemned. These are the signs that will be associated with believers: in my name they will cast out devils; they will have the gift of tongues; they will pick up snakes in their hands, and be unharmed should they drink deadly poison; they will lay their hands on the sick, who will recover.'

And so the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven: there at the right hand of God he took his place, while they, going out, preached everywhere, the Lord working with them and confirming the word by the signs that accompanied it.

Sun 12 May	The Ascension of the Lord		
(Solemnity)	(Completing the work of salvation that he was sent to do by God the Father, Our Lord Jesus Christ returned to God the Father bodily by Ascending into heaven, taking us with him, so to speak, in his risen humanity where he pleads eternally for us 'seated at the right hand of the Father').		
Mon 13 May	Our Lady of Fatima		
(Opt. Mem.)	(On May 13, 1917 the Blessed Virgin Mary began to appear to three poor shepherd children in Fatima, Portugal. To them she entrusted the message to pray the Rosary in reparation to her Immaculate Heart for the salvation of sinners. She also prophesied the start of a new and more terrible war by the 'strange light' which would be seen in the sky, a prophecy fulfilled by the red light seen in the sky across Europe on the eve of Hitler's invasion of Poland).		
Tue 14 May	St Matthias, Apostle		
(Feast)	(With the betrayal, despair and death of the Apostle Judas, the Apostles decided under the guidance of the Holy Spirit to assign his office to another. They chose Matthias as one who had been with them from the beginning of Jesus'public ministry and was a witness to it. (cf Acts 1:12-26).		
Sat 18 May	St John I, Pope, Martyr		
(Opt. Mem.)	(Martyred in 526 this Pope lived in time of great dissension within the Church as the ruler of Italy of his day was an Arian Christian (ie a heretic) who ultimately imprisoned and martyred the Pope in a bid to impose the heresy on the whole Church.		



In the 1970s the Catholic Charismatic Renewal (CCR) was an active group in the parish of St Michael's Lane Cove. The Nolan family were leaders in that group.

Pope Francis has given the movement new vigour establishing a body, *Charis*, within the Vatican which is charged with co-ordinating CCR worldwide.

Aid me by your grace to practice the divine lessons of humility, poverty, obedience, and contempt of the world, which Jesus taught us in His mortal life.

Oh, rend the heavens, and come down, consoling Spirit! that inspired and encouraged by you, I may faithfully comply with the duties of my state, carry my daily cross most patiently, and endeavor to accomplish the divine will with the utmost perfection. Spirit of love! Spirit of purity! Spirit of peace! Sanctify my soul more and more, and give me that heavenly peace which the world cannot give. Bless our Holy Father the Pope, bless the Church, bless our bishops, our priests, all Religious Orders, and all the faithful, that they may be filled with the spirit of Christ and labor earnestly for the spread of His kingdom.

O Holy Spirit, Giver of every good and perfect gift, grant me, I beseech you, the intentions of this novena. May your will be done in me and through me. May you be praised and glorified forevermore! Amen.
